Description of Course

In this course, we will explore technology and its impacts on individuals, businesses, and society. Computer-based information technology (IT) has pervaded nearly all aspects of modern businesses and society. This course introduces many IT concepts and will help you understand and manage the impact of IT on economic, political, organizational, and personal issues. This course has been designed as a high-level, introductory survey of the Management Information Systems (MIS) discipline.

Course Format and Teaching Methods

Lecture, in-class discussion, small-group activities, web-delivered assessment, etc.

Course Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes

By completing this course, you will demonstrate proficiency to:

- Describe the definition of MIS and its relation to business,
- Describe the basics of networking, databases, and system design,
- Describe, compare, and contrast data mining and visualization techniques,
- Effectively communicate to both business and IT professionals orally and via email,
- Develop a habit of reading technology news and assess technology personally and socially, and
- Analyze real cases of online privacy and illustrate its relation to our digital life.

Learning Opportunities

Opening and Closing Review Questions: We will start and end each lecture by reviewing questions discussed in the previous and the current lecture, respectively. The review questions are great opportunities for you to reflect on your understanding on the facts and concepts we covered in the class. Those questions will appear in assignments and exams as well.

5 News Reports: Management Information Systems is a field where new and exciting things are happening every day. To stay on top of the changes we will be regularly discussing items from tech

news, and your participation will be graded. We will start each lecture with a news sharing discussion. You are expected to share five (5) news articles throughout the semester. In addition to the news article, please provide a short report (300 words at least) that covers a summary of the news article, its business and social implications, personal attitudes and thoughts, and its relevance to our course.

- **4 Assignments:** Assignments link class knowledge to realistic problems and critical thinking. There are four (4) assignments in this course. The assignments are submitted via D2L.
- **4 Weekly Exams & 1 Final Exam:** Exams help check your progress in the course. There are four (4) weekly exams and a final exam throughout the semester. We will have a weekly exam every Friday, and the final exam on the last meeting day. Each exam will have questions in multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank, and short-essay. Each exam is closed-book and closed-notes.

Community Collaboration and Participation (10%): Community collaboration and participation are 10% of your grade. Attendance will be taken at random. Each absence without excuse will lead to a loss of 10 points (1%) of your final grade.

News Reports (15%): Each report counts for 30 points (3%) of the final grade. You can submit a maximum of one per day. The last day of submitting news reports is July 5, 2017.

Assignments (40%): Each assignment counts for 100 points (10%) of the final grade. Each assignment is due at 11:59 PM on the next Monday after announcement. Late submissions within 24 hours after the deadline will receive a penalty of 10 points (1%) of your final grade. Late submissions after 24 hours will not be accepted and you will receive a zero for that assignment.

Weekly Exams (20%): Each weekly exam counts for 50 points (5%) of the final grade. Extra credits will be given as bonus questions in the weekly exams.

Final Exam (15%): The final exam counts for 150 points (15%) of the final grade.
